Message from the Garden

One thing that **does** slow down with the calm of autumn is Lupe's Community Garden. From outdoor storytime to delicious rhubarb, cucumbers, and watermelon, the garden had a season of sunshine and growth. Read below a message from the garden's Program Manager:

This summer, the garden kicked off the season with a planting day for kids, in the rain! We laughed off the rain as we planted small pots of the child's choice of seeds (flower, herb, or vegetable). The kids also got to try out their hand at being a pollinator and transport pollen from flower to flower in a mock insect activity. Food Hero graciously donated materials, as well as a take-home project on Juneteenth traditions with recipes for families to make. Another family event







was Storytime with Katey, our local librarian from the Philomath Community Library. After several stories and many snacks, the children felt the energy for a game of hide-and-seek within the orchard. However, it turned into a giggle fest since some creativity was needed in hiding spots. An apple tree can only hide you so well. We also held two pop-up clinics (summer: tomatoes and peppers, fall: frost-tolerant veggies) for at-home gardeners to plant and take home in containers.

On the maintenance front, we got our shed painted thanks to one brave young man. Thank you, Marshall, who not only scaled the ladder but also battled a few flying insect nests. The garden was fortunate to have an intern for the summer who cleared some of the garden's overgrown areas. Along the lines of sprucing up the garden, we had two groups: OSU's sustainability class and Corvallis' Community Services Consortium's youth gardeners come prepare garden beds for the community gardeners.

In September, the Garden hosted Art in the Garden, a partnership with Maxtivity. Where artists of all ages can come create in any form of expression, with the garden serving as their inspiration. We hope that this event will spin off many others and encourage the garden to be more than just a spot to grow food. As summer transitions to fall, the garden is still actively gathering produce before the rains turn cold and the shift from warm-season fruits and vegetables to cold-tolerant vegetables. This year's produce ranged from melons to apples, peppers to okra, kale to friese, green beans to parsley, just to name a few. There are potatoes and winter squashes to come in the next few months. The garden, along with the greenhouse, will put most of the beds to rest for the upcoming winter months while maintaining a few for kale, mustard greens, root crops, and a few herbs.

I want to thank all our volunteers, community gardeners, and PCS staff who contributed to the success of the garden this year. I hope we can maintain that energy and heart for the garden in 2026.






Reaching Out
